

Thank you for participating in our service time poll! In response to your preferences, in-person Morning Prayer on the church lawn is every Sunday at 9:00 am, weather permitting. Thank you for speaking up and letting us know what works for you. The RPG has worked hard to get ready for in-person services, including signage, check in procedures, and socially distanced spacing. One entrance to the parking lot will be blocked off by cone so that traffic is directed one way. Please *bring a folding chair, wear your mask, and stay 6 feet from other people* who did not arrive in your car. A greeter will meet you at your car and direct you to the marked socially distant spots on the sidewalk to enter the main church gate (not the office gate). The greeter will have extra masks if you forgot yours.

We know that some of us have conflicts on some Sundays, are not ready to come to in person worship yet, or may need or want to worship online from time to time. We will do our best to stream our in-person service on Facebook Live each week at 9:00 am, if you would like to join us that way, and will also continue online Morning Prayer at 10:00 am — both on the Emmanuel web site and the Emmanuel Facebook page. The in-person service will be live, and there is always the potential for technical glitches, but the recorded service will be available both on the Emmanuel web site and the Emmanuel Facebook page if there is any issue with the streamed service.

We have disappointing news for those who were not able to read the Emmanuel Constant Contact from Wednesday of this week. **Due to COVID-driven declining enrollment, the vestry voted at its regular meeting on Tuesday to suspend Emmanuel Day School's operations.** We share this news with very heavy hearts, as providing a high quality, nurturing educational environment for our EDS children has been Emmanuel's treasured privilege for decades.

COVID time has affected all of our lives and institutions, and families all over the country are making the difficult decision to homeschool their children or keep them in small neighborhood "pods." These understandable decisions have affected the enrollment at EDS, which is now at less than half capacity. The vestry recognized that we cannot sustain the EDS program at those levels, and voted to suspend EDS operations.

We bring this sad news on behalf of the vestry, sharing your disappointment and regret. We are grateful beyond words for the devotion and professionalism of the EDS staff — Carissa, Kate, Terri, and Sarah. Please reach out to Della+ or to Deb Venancio or Maggie Martin, your wardens, with any questions. We pray for all of our Emmanuel community's health and safety, especially for our EDS teachers and families, and for an effective vaccine that can control this virus that has affected all of our lives.

At the gate, you will have a quick health screening and temperature check, receive a bulletin, and be guided to your socially distanced spot for worship. As glad as we are to see each other, we won't make physical contact — no handshaking or hugging. And (really sadly for me) we can't sing. But this will be fun. It's louder outdoors, and there may be emergency traffic or trucks on Spring Street, gulls or planes overhead, or even boat horns in the harbor — those of you who are veterans of outdoor services at Emmanuel know that. Dennis Bristow will be helping us with a sound system so that you will be able to hear. We'll keep a weather eye out, and let you know by Constant Contact, the web site, and Facebook post if we need to cancel outdoor services due to rain. In addition to your mask and a folding chair, *you may want to wear a hat, or bring an umbrella to protect you from the sun.* We have scheduled the service early — 9:00 am — to avoid the hottest part of the day when the sun is directly overhead. We will continue our 10:00 am Sunday Facebook Live Morning Prayer for those who prefer to worship indoors, or who are not able to or comfortable coming to the church. Remember that the virtual services are recorded. You can worship with those services at any time after they are initially posted at 10:00 on Sundays.

Remember that we will wear masks and maintain social distance at all church meetings that are held in person (not on Zoom), whether they are held indoors or outdoors, or at the church or another location.

Technology: WE WILL ALSO CONTINUE OUR ONLINE WORSHIP. Each Sunday, we will post the week's Morning Prayer service at 10:00 am both on the Emmanuel web site (https://emmanuelnewport.org/worship/virtual_emmanuel/) and on Facebook. If you are a regular user of Facebook, please "like" and "follow" Emmanuel Church, Newport's page. This will give you notifications of Events, Watch Parties, or Video Premier. If you are not a regular user of Facebook and you want to watch through Facebook, you can click on the Facebook link on Emmanuel's webpage: (<https://emmanuelnewport.org>). This link will take you to Emmanuel Church Newport's Facebook page, where you can click on "Posts" in the left-hand column. The Watch Party will be the top post. You can click on the video to make it larger. When you go to Emmanuel's pages, you will see a menu on the left, where you can click on Video, which will have a red 'live' tag for a Video Premier. You are encouraged to comment during the service and talk with each other, so please enter your comments, or click on the emoticons during the service.

Let's remember our friends who may not be able to join us in person or by computer or tablet. If you can, check in and see if they might like to "go to church" virtually with you, listening to the live cast by telephone as you participate on your computer or tablet at home. Susan Barnes has good advice on this approach. Contact her with any questions.

The Church office is OPEN! We are excited to be getting back together. The office will be open Tuesday through Friday, from 8:30-12:00. If you are coming to the office, you will have a temperature check and health screening (cough or respiratory symptoms, muscle aches, travel to other states, etc.) and will enter your name and other details on the contact tracing log on the large table in the reception area of the office. A contact-free digital thermometer, hand sanitizer, and sanitizing wipes are on the table. When entering the office, please WEAR A MASK, and sanitize your hands upon entry. Annie will guide you in the health screening.

Did you know that, especially in these COVID-19 times when many of us are worshipping remotely, you may still *pay your pledge* in all the same ways? At present we do not use credit cards. It is because of your generosity Emmanuel continues to be with you and with our neighbors through our remote Morning Prayer service on Sundays, as well as at a Bible Study, and Coffee Hour fellowship. From August 27, 2020 Diocesan Update:

The Rhode Island Department of Health [reports](#) 108 new positive cases of COVID-19 today, with 82 people in the hospital, 10 in the ICU, and 3 requiring a ventilator. Three more Rhode Island residents have died due to the virus. The total number of [coronavirus related deaths](#) in the U.S. reached 183,959 as of noon Thursday.

Time magazine [published an article](#) on the evidence for COVID19 transmission by aerosol and the importance of responding to this new information. The author, Jose-Luis Jimenez is a Professor of Chemistry and a Fellow of the Cooperative Institute for Research in Environmental Sciences at the University of Colorado-Boulder and a Fellow of the American Association for Aerosol Research and the American Geophysical Union. Jimenez compares aerosolized virus to cigarette or vaping smoke – the closer you are to the source and the longer you are exposed to it, the more likely you are to inhale large amounts of it. Also, "in a poorly ventilated room, the smoke will accumulate, and people in the room may end up inhaling a lot of smoke over time. Talking, and especially singing and shouting increase aerosol exhalation by factors of 10 and 50, respectively. Indeed, we are finding that outbreaks often occur when people gather in crowded, insufficiently ventilated indoor spaces, such as singing at karaoke parties, cheering at clubs,

having conversations in bars, and exercising in gyms. Superspreading events, where one person infects many, occur almost exclusively in indoor locations and are driving the pandemic...Contact tracing shows that, when it comes to COVID-19, being outdoors is 20 times safer than being indoors, which argues that aerosol transmission is much more important than droplets; outdoors, there's plenty of air in which aerosols can become diluted; not so indoors."

According to [The Providence Journal](#) the Governor of Massachusetts cited a Rhode Island wedding as an event that infected nearly everyone who attended, including several Massachusetts residents, and has reinstated a 14-day quarantine requirement for Massachusetts residents who visit Rhode Island. "There was a wedding that we figured out through our contact tracing program that took place in Rhode Island where a number of people from Massachusetts went to it," Baker said. "Everybody who went to that wedding except one person tested positive for COVID."

The House of Bishops met last week with Dr. Anthony Fauci, and Bishop Knisely discussed some of the information that emerged from the meeting in the clergy town hall on Thursday, August 20. One point the bishop made is that science is now demonstrating that the virus is aerosolized by speech and breath, and can remain in the air for hours, rather than being carried by larger droplets that fall to the ground in minutes. We have also learned that 2/3 of the people who have COVID — that's 66% — are asymptomatic. Further, testing is notoriously slow, so that many who have COVID have recovered or are hospitalized by the time the test results are available. ***Masks make a huge difference, and social distancing is really important.*** Also, we are safer outdoors than indoors. Governor Raimondo has shared the statistic that we are 19x more likely to share the virus inside than outside. ***As a result of the positive effect of wearing a mask, the Bishop has updated the guidance in the diocesan Journeying by Stages document to require universal wearing of masks by those leading worship, including when preaching and celebrating.*** The exception is when the clergy or lay leader is recording or streaming a service where only their family and a limited circle of those with whom they regularly interact are present.

Dr. Fauci reiterated in the meeting that "outdoors is always better than indoors, indoors with windows open is always better than closed, and that moisture and heat are better than cold and dry" to discourage spread of the virus. He stated that there has been no documentation of outdoor super spreader events. This information is especially important to note as fall and winter approach and churches consider whether to move services inside and use heat or if it would be better to offer online worship only. Dr. Fauci clarified that when experts say, 'crowds,' it means people congregating close together. Large groups outdoors and spaced out properly is safer than small groups gathering in close quarters. Singing is worse than speaking for spreading the virus. Singing sends out more particles according to test done by scientists, so try not to sing. Face shields allow aerosolized particles to emerge underneath, therefore a mask is preferable.

The mask you choose is important! New data regarding masks is reported in [The Washington Post](#), which cited a study on the effectiveness of 14 differing kinds of masks. The study found that "some easily accessible cotton cloth masks are about as effective as standard surgical masks, while popular alternatives such as neck gaiters made of thin, stretchy material may be worse than not wearing a mask at all." The neck gaiters are comfortable but "don't restrict air, is the reason why they're not doing much of a job helping people." Some masks are more of a detriment than a good, including bandanas and knitted masks. Finally, masks with a relief valve do not protect others from the air you exhale.

Covenant for Regathering

I promise, to the best of my ability with God's help, to abide by the guidelines of the Diocese of Rhode Island for participation in church as we regather during the COVID-19 pandemic.

In faithfulness to the Baptismal Covenant (BCP p. 304-305), I will strive to:

Love my neighbor as myself, by...

- Wearing a mask or scarf over my nose and mouth at all times in church buildings, except momentarily to receive the sacrament or lead worship by an assigned speaking part, and following public health guidelines for hand sanitizing and disinfecting.
- Only attending worship if I am non-symptomatic for the COVID-19 virus or any other transmittable disease that could compromise the health of another person also attending.
- Abstaining from attending worship if I am concerned that doing so would be too great a risk due to my own health status.

Respect the dignity of every human being, by...

- Making no physical contact while at church with people beyond the members of my own household.
- Maintaining a six foot or more distance from other members of the congregation.
- Respecting any requests for distance, masking, cleaning, and disinfecting to ensure the safety and comfort level of others.

Seek and serve Christ in all people by...

- Supporting the decisions of my diocesan and congregational leaders.
- Staying connected with others in my community by telephone, video chat, mail, or other means.

This is our expectation for all those who wish to worship with us in person. By participating in our worship, you assume responsibility for following the above, and acknowledge the risks of participation in an in-person gathering.
