ANNOUNCEMENTS

In-person Morning Prayer on the church lawn Sundays at 8:00 am, weather permitting. We know that 8:00 am is early for some people. The Reopening Planning Group (RPG) has chosen 8:00 am because it's both cooler and quieter at that hour — the sun is lower in the sky, and the traffic isn't heavy yet. And with our social distancing, there is not enough shade for everyone under the trees. *Please let the office know if you strongly prefer a different time.* We'll take a count of preferences and figure out what makes sense for the most people.

The RPG has worked hard to get ready for in-person services, including signage, check in procedures, and socially distanced spacing. One entrance to the parking lot will be blocked off by cone so that traffic is directed one way. Please *bring a folding chair, wear your mask, and stay 6 feet from other people* who did not arrive in your car. A greeter will meet you at your car and direct you to the marked socially distant spots on the sidewalk to enter the main church gate (not the office gate). The greeter will have extra masks if you forgot yours.

The Church office is OPEN! We are excited to be getting back together. The office will be open Tuesday through Friday, from 8:30-12:00. If you are coming to the office, you will have a temperature check and health screening (cough or respiratory symptoms, muscle aches, travel to other states, etc.) and will enter your name and other details on the contact tracing log on the large table in the reception area of the office. A contact-free digital thermometer, hand sanitizer, and sanitizing wipes are on the table. When entering the office, please **WEAR A MASK**, and sanitize your hands upon entry. Annie will guide you in the health screening.

At the gate, you will have a quick health screening and temperature check, receive a bulletin, and be guided to your socially distanced spot for worship. As glad as we are to see each other, we won't make physical contact — no handshaking or hugging. And (really sadly for me) we can't sing. But this will be fun. It's louder outdoors, and there may be emergency traffic or trucks on Spring Street, gulls or planes overhead, or even boat horns in the harbor — those of you who are veterans of outdoor services at Emmanuel know that. Dennis Bristow will be helping us with a sound system so that you will be able to hear. We'll keep a weather eye out, and let you know by Constant Contact, the web site, and Facebook post if we need to cancel outdoor services due to rain. In addition to your mask and a folding chair, *you may want to wear a hat, or bring an umbrella to protect you from the sun.* We have scheduled the service early — 8:00 am — to avoid the hottest part of the day when the sun is directly overhead. We will continue our 10:00 am Sunday Facebook Live Morning Prayer for those who prefer to worship indoors, or who are not able to or comfortable coming to the church. Remember that the virtual services are recorded. You can worship with those services at any time after they are initially posted at 10:00 on Sundays.

Remember that we will wear masks and maintain social distance at all church meetings that are held in person (not on Zoom), whether they are held indoors or outdoors, or at the church or another location.

Each Sunday, we will post the week's Morning Prayer service at 10:00 am both on the Emmanuel web site (https://emmanuelnewport.org/worship/virtual_emmanuel/) and on Facebook. If you are a regular user of Facebook, please "like" and "follow" Emmanuel Church, Newport's page. This will give you notifications of Events, Watch Parties, or Video Premier. If you are not a regular user of Facebook and you want to watch through Facebook, you can click on the Facebook link on Emmanuel's webpage: (<https://emmanuelnewport.org>). This link will take you to Emmanuel Church Newport's Facebook page, where you can click on "Posts" in the left-hand column. The Watch Party will be the top post. You can click on the video to make it larger. When you go to Emmanuel's pages, you will see a menu on the left, where you can click on Video, which will have a red 'live' tag for a Video Premier. You are encouraged to comment during the service and talk with each other, so please enter your comments, or click on the emoticons during the service.

Let's remember our friends who may not be able to join us in person or by computer or tablet. If you can, check in and see if they might like to "go to church" virtually with you, listening to the live cast by telephone as you participate on your computer or tablet at home. Susan Barnes has good advice on this approach. Contact her with any questions.

Did you know that, especially in these COVID-19 times when many of us are worshipping remotely, you may still *pay your pledge* in all the same ways? There are easy ways to do this! **First**, you can mail in a check, **or** use your bank's online bill pay option (you send a check through your bank online), **or** go to our website - www.emmanuelnewport.org - and click on "Donate" to make a secure on-line payment through VANCO using your checking or savings account to pay your pledge. At present we do not use credit cards. It is because of your generosity Emmanuel continues to be with you and with our neighbors through our remote Morning Prayer service on Sundays, as well as at a Bible Study, and Coffee Hour fellowship. From this week's Diocesan Update: The Presiding Bishop, his staff, bishops, and canons met yesterday with Dr. Anthony Fauci to discuss COVID-19 and to ask questions about best practices for churches in light of updated scientific information. Dr. Fauci said that given the most recent data, there is good reason to believe that we can reopen most of the country if the majority of people follow three basic guidelines: 1. universal wearing of masks, 2. physical distancing, and 3. avoiding crowds. Dr. Fauci noted that people should understand these measures as a gateway to allow us to do the things we hope to do, such as reopening the economy, reopening schools, vote, and holding in person worship. ***The Bishop is therefore updating the guidance in the diocesan Journeying by Stages document to require universal wearing of masks by those leading worship, including when preaching and celebrating.*** The exception is when the clergy or lay leader is recording or streaming a service where only their family and a limited circle of those with whom they regularly interact are present. Clergy are to be especially mindful of modeling the behavior we wish to encourage, both online and in person.

Dr. Fauci confirmed that "outdoors is always better than indoors, indoors with windows open is always better than closed, and that moisture and heat are better than cold and dry" to discourage spread of the virus. He stated that there has been no documentation of outdoor super spreader events. This information is especially important to note as fall and winter approach and churches consider whether to move services inside and use heat or if it would be better to offer online worship only. Dr. Fauci clarified that when experts say, 'crowds,' it means people congregating close together. Large groups outdoors and spaced out properly is safer than small groups gathering in close quarters. Singing is worse than speaking for spreading the virus. Singing sends out more particles according to test done by scientists, so try not to sing. Face shields allow aerosolized particles to emerge underneath, therefore a mask is preferable.

The mask you choose is important! New data regarding masks is reported in [The Washington Post](#), which cited a study on the effectiveness of 14 differing kinds of masks. The study found that "some easily accessible cotton cloth masks are about as effective as standard surgical masks, while popular alternatives such as neck gaiters made of thin, stretchy material may be worse than not wearing a mask at all." The neck gaiters are comfortable but "don't restrict air, is the reason why they're not doing much of a job helping people." Some masks are more of a detriment than a good, including bandanas and knitted masks. Finally, masks with a relief valve do not protect others from the air you exhale.

Rhode Island has 74 new [COVID-19 cases](#), 89 people are hospitalized, 9 are in the ICU, and 3 require a ventilator. Two more people have died from the virus for a total of 1,018 in the state. Rhode Islanders are no longer required to quarantine when traveling to Connecticut, New York, and New Jersey.

Governor Raimondo held a press gathering yesterday and emphasized important COVID-19 guidelines. She reminded everyone of “the golden rule in this pandemic – the number one thing we keep repeating. If you are sick at all – even if it’s just a headache – stay home.” The Governor also highlighted the importance of three facets of contact tracing: “First, keep your contact tracing journal. Take one minute every day to write down the names of everyone you saw that day. Second, if you’re the one organizing a gathering... write down the names and phone numbers of everyone you have over. If someone tests positive and says they were at your house, the contact tracers’ first call will be to you, and they’ll need to know the names and numbers of everyone who was there. Third, if you get called by the contact tracers, please answer the phone and provide your information...no personally identifiable information is stored in the system, and all the information you provide is protected by the strictest privacy standards under HIPAA.” Contact tracing practices apply to worship services, so please follow the guidelines.

Covenant for Regathering

I promise, to the best of my ability with God's help, to abide by the guidelines of the Diocese of Rhode Island for participation in church as we regather during the COVID-19 pandemic.

In faithfulness to the Baptismal Covenant (BCP p. 304-305), I will strive to:

Love my neighbor as myself, by...

- Wearing a mask or scarf over my nose and mouth at all times in church buildings, except momentarily to receive the sacrament or lead worship by an assigned speaking part, and following public health guidelines for hand sanitizing and disinfecting.
- Only attending worship if I am non-symptomatic for the COVID-19 virus or any other transmittable disease that could compromise the health of another person also attending.
- Abstaining from attending worship if I am concerned that doing so would be too great a risk due to my own health status.

Respect the dignity of every human being, by...

- Making no physical contact while at church with people beyond the members of my own household.
- Maintaining a six foot or more distance from other members of the congregation.
- Respecting any requests for distance, masking, cleaning, and disinfecting to ensure the safety and comfort level of others.

Seek and serve Christ in all people by...

- Supporting the decisions of my diocesan and congregational leaders.
- Staying connected with others in my community by telephone, video chat, mail, or other means.

This is our expectation for all those who wish to worship with us in person. By participating in our worship, you assume responsibility for following the above, and acknowledge the risks of participation in an in-person gathering.
