THE FIRST READING

The word that came to Jeremiah from the Lord: "Come, go down to the potter's house, and there I will let you hear my words." So I went down to the potter's house, and there he was working at his wheel. The vessel he was making of clay was spoiled in the potter's hand, and he reworked it into another vessel, as seemed good to him.

Then the word of the Lord came to me: Can I not do with you, O house of Israel, just as this potter has done? says the Lord. Just like the clay in the potter's hand, so are you in my hand, O house of Israel. At one moment I may declare concerning a nation or a kingdom, that I will pluck up and break down and destroy it, but if that nation, concerning which I have spoken, turns from its evil, I will change my mind about the disaster that I intended to bring on it. And at another moment I may declare concerning a nation or a kingdom that I will build and plant it, but if it does evil in my sight, not listening to my voice, then I will change my mind about the good that I had intended to do to it.



THE SECOND READING

Paul, a prisoner of Christ Jesus, and Timothy our brother,

To Philemon our dear friend and co-worker, to Apphia our sister, to Archippus our fellow soldier, and to the church in your house:

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

When I remember you in my prayers, I always thank my God because I hear of your love for all the saints and your faith toward the Lord Jesus. I pray that the sharing of your faith may become effective when you perceive all the good that we may do for Christ. I have indeed received much joy and encouragement from your love, because the hearts of the saints have been refreshed through you, my brother.

For this reason, though I am bold enough in Christ to command you to do your duty, yet I would rather appeal to you on the basis of love-- and I, Paul, do this as an old man, and now also as a prisoner of Christ Jesus. I am appealing to you for my child, Onesimus, whose father I have become during my imprisonment. Formerly he was useless to you, but now he is indeed useful both to you and to me. I am sending him, that is, my own heart, back to you. I wanted to keep him with me, so that he might be of service to me in your place during my imprisonment for the gospel; but I preferred to do nothing without your consent, in order that your good deed might be voluntary and not something forced. Perhaps this is the reason he was separated from you for a while, so that you might have him back forever, no longer as a slave but more than a slave, a beloved brother-- especially to me but how much more to you, both in the flesh and in the Lord.

So if you consider me your partner, welcome him as you would welcome me. If he has wronged you in any way, or owes you anything, charge that to my account. I, Paul, am writing this with my own hand: I will repay it. I say nothing about your owing me even your own self. Yes, brother, let me have this benefit from you in the Lord! Refresh my heart in Christ. Confident of your obedience, I am writing to you, knowing that you will do even more than I say.

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From your Rector

We've been talking over these past weeks about climate change, and its role in causing migration as people seek resources and flee climate change's life-threatening effects — fire, drought, floods, food scarcity, and rising oceans. In some places in the world, migration leads to war and conflict over scarce and diminishing resources. Then that war and conflict further challenge resources, creating a rapid downward spiral. Even in our country's relatively stable political and economic environment, climate change affects us all, is caused primarily by the well-resourced countries, affects the least resourced and especially the island communities most, and is the most important issue we all have together. As island dwellers ourselves, we feel this directly. In fact, Rhode Island is the first among the lower 48 states to see a 2 degree Celsius (3.6 degree Fahrenheit) rise in our average temperature, and Aquidneck Island, our home, has already seen shoreline effects.

Some of you may know that I have been serving on a small diocesan committee studying potential future uses of the Cathedral block in Providence. Early in 2022, Bishop Knisely recruited lay and clergy leaders with experience in finance, real estate, and project development to work with Denham-Wolf, consultants based in New York who have helped other dioceses in The Episcopal Church create a decision pathway for their cathedrals and surrounding real estate. In addition to then Diocesan CFO Dennis Burton, and incoming Diocesan CFO Ed Biddle, the committee consisted of Della+, Scott Avedisian, Lora McFall, Peter Lofgren, and Bill Hatfield.

We met once a week, for two hours each time, for around 12 weeks concluding in June to complete our process of analysis and make a report to Bishop Knisely. We have continued our meetings following the conclusion of the consultation to prepare our report to Convention. Some of you may have responded to the survey distributed by the committee in the spring on your views respecting the Cathedral Block. And of course our conversations included concerns related to land use and the effects of climate change, not only in the state's business and economic profile, but also in its actual coastal and waterfront shape. Given our conversations in sermons and newsletters over these past weeks about the climate emergency, you might be interested to see some of the climate resilience planning that the State of Rhode Island has prepared. Please visit www.RIchamp.org to find this information. If we make changes in how we think about single-use plastics, compost, and fuel use at Emmanuel, will that make all the difference the world needs? Maybe not, but I think it could make a world's difference in each of us.
