PROGRAM NOTES, by Randy Elkins, June 30, 2023

We've made it past the worst of the pandemic and perhaps we're in a celebrating mood. I was challenged by a Musicians' Circle member to give this program a name and so I did. As I put musical celebrations together I try to include diverse traditions and styles and from musicians of many backgrounds.

Today we hear music by the beloved Black composer, Scott Joplin, born in Texarkana, Texas (there's a Texarkana, Arkansas as well). Joplin is perhaps most famous for writing *The Entertainer* which was made famous in the 1973 movie *The Sting*. The performer for the *Maple Leaf Rag* was a last minute addition to replace someone who had to work today. That performer? Emmanuel Newport's organist/choirmaster from 1930 to 1932, E. Power Biggs, considered by many to be the foremost concert organist of the 20th century.

Our own *Associate Priest and Theologian*, Maggi Dawn, is a musician as well! She will introduce us to *O God Our Help [Psalm 90]*, which she wrote in 2015. It's a contemporary look at a text that we often sing automatically, not thinking about the words. She has added part of Psalm 90 that hymn writer Isaac Watts didn't include in his version found in many hymnals. Maggi has written a thoroughly delightful, catchy melody that I can certainly imagine a 21st century Moses singing beside the Red Sea.

New York has *New York, New York,* Texas has *Texas, Our Texas,* my home state has the best one -*Georgia On My Mind*, but what about us Rhodies? We've got the wonderful song *Rhode Island Is Famous for You* and our own Nancy Zitka will entertain you with it.

As I planned this program I did new research on the next two numbers. Did you know that Kate Smith didn't write *God Bless America* and that *This Land Is Your Land* became famous without ever being played widely on the radio? I learned that Irving Berlin originally wrote *God Bless America* in 1918 but set it aside because it didn't fit the current comedy musical he wrote it for. In 1938 he felt the country had a need for this song, so he gave it a touch up and the version we know was born. The original recording of *God Bless America* was played so often on the radio that American troubadour Woody Gutherie got tired of hearing it and wrote his own song about his beloved home, *This Land Is Your Land*. I also didn't know that it became famous by word of mouth, not through radio playtime, as *God Bless America* had. Our *Artist in Residence*, Ali Hosford, will sing *God Bless America* and then the Musicians' Circle will lead us all in singing *This Land Is Your Land*.

Summertime from George Gershwin's opera Porgy & Bess, is a lullaby sung near the beginning of the opera. My voice teacher, Camilla Williams, made the first recording of the full opera in 1951 and for that reason it has a special place in my heart. One summer I was running a music festival and had every performer do Summertime in their own style. Quite fun! And finally, also by Gershwin, are two movements from a suite titled Three Preludes, written for piano in 1926. These pieces are examples of American classical music that is influenced by jazz. Suzanna Laramee will play the first two: 1. Allegro ben ritmato e deciso (quickly with decisive rhythm), and 2. Andante con moto (at a walking pace with movement) bridging our Musicians' Circle presentation to our service of Holy Eucharist.

THE FIRST READING

God tested Abraham. He said to him, "Abraham!" And he said, "Here I am." He said, "Take your son, your only son Isaac, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah, and offer him there as a burnt offering on one of the mountains that I shall show you." So Abraham rose early in the morning, saddled his donkey, and took two of his young men with him, and his son Isaac; he cut the wood for the burnt offering, and set out and went to the place in the distance that God had shown him. On the third day Abraham looked up and saw the place far away. Then Abraham said to his young men, "Stay here with the donkey; the boy and I will go over there; we will worship, and then we will come back to you." Abraham took the wood of the burnt offering and laid it on his son Isaac, and he himself carried the fire and the knife. So the two of them walked on together. Isaac said to his father Abraham, "Father!" And he said, "Here I am, my son." He said, "The fire and the wood are here, but where is the lamb for a burnt offering?" Abraham said, "God himself will provide the lamb for a burnt offering, my son." So the two of them walked on together.

When they came to the place that God had shown him, Abraham built an altar there and laid the wood in order. He bound his son Isaac, and laid him on the altar, on top of the wood. Then Abraham reached out his hand and took the knife to kill his son. But the angel of the Lord called to him from heaven, and said, "Abraham, Abraham!" And he said, "Here I am." He said, "Do not lay your hand on the boy or do anything to him; for now I know that you fear God, since you have not withheld your son, your only son, from me." And Abraham looked up and saw a ram, caught in a thicket by its horns. Abraham went and took the ram and offered it up as a burnt offering instead of his son. So Abraham called that place "The Lord will provide"; as it is said to this day, "On the mount of the Lord it shall be provided." -Genesis 22:1-14

PSALM 13



How long, O Lord? will you forget me for ever? * how long will you hide your face from me? How long shall I have perplexity in my mind, and grief in my heart, day after <u>day</u>?* how long shall my enemy triumph over me?

Look upon me and answer me, O Lord my <u>God</u>; * give light to my eyes, lest I sleep in <u>death</u>; Lest my enemy say, "I have prevailed over him," * and my foes rejoice that I have **fallen**.

THE SECOND READING

Do not let sin exercise dominion in your mortal bodies, to make you obey their passions. No longer present your members to sin as instruments of wickedness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and present your members to God as instruments of righteousness. For sin will have no dominion over you, since you are not under law but under grace. What then? Should we sin because we are not under law but under grace? By no means! Do you not know that if you present yourselves to anyone as obedient slaves, you are slaves of the one whom you obey, either of sin, which leads to death, or of obedience, which leads to righteousness? But thanks be to God that you, having once been slaves of sin, have become obedient from the heart to the form of teaching to which you were entrusted, and that you, having been set free from sin, have become slaves of righteousness. I am speaking in human terms because of your natural limitations. For just as you once presented your members as slaves to impurity and to greater and greater iniquity, so now present your members as slaves to righteousness for sanctification.

When you were slaves of sin, you were free in regard to righteousness. So what advantage did you then get from the things of which you now are ashamed? The end of those things is death. But now that you have been freed from sin and enslaved to God, the advantage you get is sanctification. The end is eternal life. For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord. *-Romans 6:12-23*


