

When the Lord was about to take Elijah up to heaven by a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. Elijah said to Elisha, "Stay here; for the Lord has sent me as far as Bethel." But Elisha said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they went down to Bethel. The company of prophets who were in Bethel came out to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the Lord will take your master away from you?" And he said, "Yes, I know; keep silent."

Elijah said to him, "Elisha, stay here; for the Lord has sent me to Jericho." But he said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they came to Jericho. The company of prophets who were at Jericho drew near to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the Lord will take your master away from you?" And he answered, "Yes, I know; be silent."

Then Elijah said to him, "Stay here; for the Lord has sent me to the Jordan." But he said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So the two of them went on. Fifty men of the company of prophets also went, and stood at some distance from them, as they both were standing by the Jordan. Then Elijah took his mantle and rolled it up, and struck the water; the water was parted to the one side and to the other, until the two of them crossed on dry ground.

When they had crossed, Elijah said to Elisha, "Tell me what I may do for you, before I am taken from you." Elisha said, "Please let me inherit a double share of your spirit." He responded, "You have asked a hard thing; yet, if you see me as I am being taken from you, it will be granted you; if not, it will not." As they continued walking and talking, a chariot of fire and horses of fire separated the two of them, and Elijah ascended in a whirlwind into heaven. Elisha kept watching and crying out, "Father, father! The chariots of Israel and its horsemen!" But when he could no longer see him, he grasped his own clothes and tore them in two pieces. *-2 Kings 2:1-12*

THE HOLY GOSPEL

Priest The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark. *People* Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus took with him Peter and James and John, and led them up a high mountain apart, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them. And there appeared to them Elijah with Moses, who were talking with Jesus. Then Peter said to Jesus, "Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." He did not know what to say, for they were terrified. Then a cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud there came a voice, "This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!" Suddenly when they looked around, they saw no one with them any more, but only Jesus. As they were coming down the mountain, he ordered them to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead. *-Mark 9:2-9*

THE SERMON

THE NICENE CREED, recited together, standing



From the Rector

Sunday we celebrate the Last Sunday after the Epiphany as we look ahead to our Shrove Tuesday Valentine's Day pancake supper at 6:00 pm on Tuesday, with Ash Wednesday services at 6:00 pm on Wednesday, February 14. The last of the camels has left the manger on the high altar, turning back East from Bethlehem alongside the magi by another way, as Matthew's gospel tells us. Camels are great sand cargo vehicles, able to carry heavy burdens over long distances in a desert climate. With a form factor uniquely suited to accompanying travelers over difficult terrain, camels are also great vehicles for our theological imaginations as we contemplate our own pilgrimage through Lent. What will we carry with us over those 40 days? Where are we headed, how have we prepared ourselves for the journey, and how will we be changed when we get there?

Our gospel reading Sunday is Jesus' transfiguration from Mark's gospel, when Peter, James, and John accompany Jesus up a high mountain and then see Jesus transfigured — his face shining like the sun and his clothes dazzling white. And if that wasn't enough, Moses and Elijah appear with Jesus in conversation, representing our faith history in the law (Moses) and the prophets (Elijah).

Many call the Holy Lands the Fifth Gospel, referring to the way the unique features of the land — the distance between holy places, and even the angle of the sun on the stones — help us to understand the gospels in a new way. While Mark's gospel doesn't identify the mountain where Jesus' dazzling transfiguration takes place, in the Fifth Gospel of the Holy Lands, the church remembers that Jesus, Moses, and Elijah's conversation took place on Mount Tabor, which looks out over the fields and valleys of the lower Galilee, up into the hills and mountains of the North.

Let's keep our minds on the Fifth Gospel as we leave Epiphany to travel through Lent. What are the features of the spaces we traverse, how does the journey change us, and who do we meet along the way? I'll be praying my way along by camel.

Shrove Tuesday, Mardi Gras and *Valentine's Day* pancake supper is Tuesday, February 13 at 6:00 p.m. in the Library. The menu includes pancakes and the fixins, entertainment is by *Caleb Dinger and the Emmanuel Jazz Collective*. What a great day to bring a guest with you to something at Emmanuel. And don't forget the beads, masks, etc! Who will get the prize from the King Cake?
