You shall not covet anything that belongs to your neighbor. Amen. Lord have mercy.


CONFESSION OF SIN

Gracious Father, whose blessed Son Jesus Christ came down from heaven to be the true bread which gives life to the world: Evermore give us this bread, that he may live in us, and we in him; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

THE FIRST READING

From Mount Hor the Israelites set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of Edom; but the people became impatient on the way. The people spoke against God and against Moses, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food." Then the Lord sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God-- not the result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life.

THE NICENE CREED, recited together, standing and facing East

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. 

Priest and People Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.


The Priest continues We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, ... concluding... we are bold to say:

From the Rector...

Sunday was a special day at Emmanuel, as we welcomed Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Community Center Executive Director Heather Strout as our preacher. Emmanuel has long supported the work of the MLK Center through the hydroponics program, nonperishable food collection in the little red wagon (including the can of soup "admission ticket" to the Lenten program!), and direct financial gifts. These are essential ways we engage in our community, taking part in important conversations and knowing and helping our neighbors. As I mentioned Sunday, our "First Sunday of the Month" looseplate collection will be given to the MLK Center to support our shared work in the community, and you were generous with your gifts.

We also had encouraging news last week from our neighbors in the Diocese of Western Tanganyika (DWT), who are not close in proximity, but are near to our hearts. Our friend Bishop Emmanuel Bwatta, who visited Emmanuel Church in January 2020, wrote to share that the sewing program we supported with a gift from the Rector's Discretionary Fund, along with a personal gift from Jere and me, is at work changing lives in Tanzania. I was especially happy that the first program was established in Nguruka, a fishing village near Lake Tanganyika with a very high Muslim population. Bishop Emmanuel and his predecessor, Bishop Sadock Makaya, have worked very hard to promote interfaith understanding and mutual respect in these villages where there has historically been interfaith conflict and violence.

I attended an ordination in Nguruka in the summer of 2016, and Bishop Sadock invited the ordinands' Muslim friends to come sit on the chancel with us to support the new priests on the important occasion of their ordination. It was an incredibly moving service, and the singing and dancing afterward were spectacular. The intentional involvement of young Christian and Muslim women is an absolutely wonderful continuation of peacebuilding and service to the whole community.

You will easily see from +Emmanuel's note that his first language is Swahili — but I could only dream of my Swahili being as competent as his English.
