You shall not covet anything that belongs to your neighbor. Amen. Lord have mercy.


CONFESSION OF SIN

Now among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, "Sir, we wish to see Jesus." Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. Jesus answered them, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honor. "Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say—'Father, save me from this hour'? No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your name." Then a voice came from heaven, "I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again." The crowd standing there heard it and said that it was thunder. THE SERMON

THE NICENE CREED, recited together, standing and facing East



Priest and People Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.


The Priest continues We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, ... concluding...we are bold to say:

Delivered by Suzanna Laramee to reNewport attendees in the Library last week...

"Like other social service organizations, Emmanuel Church expanded and refocused its mission during the pandemic. When COVID-driven enrollment declines closed the preschool operated in the parish auditorium in the Fall of 2020, Emmanuel's new rector Della Wells reached out to me. I had just taken over as board president and acting Executive Director during challenging times for *Newport Classical*. *Newport Classical* was exploring relocating from our office condo in Middletown and hoped to strengthen the local nonprofit community rather than compete with forprofit tenants in supporting commercial landlords.

Our space collaboration with Emmanuel is not a rental or a tenancy, but a shared hope and future in the Newport community, and we are thriving together. *Newport Classical* is now in our third full year of chamber concerts in the Recital Hall, playing to sellout audiences of year-round patrons. And Emmanuel is building a community of deep belonging and wide invitation, engaging important questions of human flourishing and interdependence — in our community, with the wider world, and with our environment.

The growing Emmanuel Musicians' Circle engages vocalists and instrumentalists who love to make music together, with instruments and in traditions that represent and celebrate who we are now, rather than struggling to conform to the past. The hydroponic system in the basement gymnasium grows kale, Swiss chard, and tender lettuces for MLK Community Center's Food Pantry, tended by Emmanuelites, Salve students, *Newport Classical* friends and staff, and MLK volunteers. The new community garden on the corner of Dearborn and Spring Streets provides gardening space for anyone who wants to join in the celebration of abundant life, making the iron fence a trellis for conversation and inclusion, not a barrier of entry."
