THE READING

When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately.'" They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting, "Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David! Hosanna in the highest heaven!" Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve. *-Mark 11:1-11*





From our Rector...

I hope you've had a chance to drive by the church this week and see the daffodils bursting into bloom on the corner of Dearborn and Spring Streets around the base of our Emmanuel Church/Newport Classical sign. The right arm of the sign announces <u>Newport Classical's Chamber Concert Friday evening</u> — another sold-out event! — while the right arm reminds us that Soup's On, our community meal, is coming up the Tuesday after Easter. Soup's On regulars Janet Nobis and Olivia Kirshy are filling in for Chef Jackie, who's on her spring vacation in warmer climes the first week of Eastertide, while Jim and Nina Kaull, Ellen Vadney, Margery Cousens, Liz McCarthy, Janet Park, Jon Juhase, the Maher Center residents, and our own Emmanuel busker, Dennis Bristow, do their usual great work of setting up, serving, and cleanup. The Lenten Journey programs have been a huge success, featuring conversations exploring the history of Lenten traditions in our own and other denominations, and how poetry, visual arts, music, and the psychology of temptation itself can help us to hear God's voice in our lives, preparing us for our work in community together.

Many of you may remember our pandemic Lent several years ago, when every Sunday we wrote our prayers on ribbons, representing our "haloes" — our best hopes and dreams for each other and our community. We tied them to the churchyard fence, where they fluttered with our prayers throughout the 40 days and nights of Lent. We gathered them up after church on Palm Sunday, washed and ironed them, and wove them into the altar cloth for Easter Sunday. When we live out the story of our lives together, loving God with all our heart, mind, and strength, and loving our neighbors as ourselves, the many separate ribbons of our lives are woven into the fabric of our community.

We *all* wondered how we'd get all the different lengths, colors, widths, and textures of ribbon woven together into one cloth. To this day, I can't tell you *how* we did it — or that the multicolored altar cloth of our dreams is orderly and uniform. But the haloed — *hallowed* — ribbons of our lives are indeed woven into the fabric of our altar cloth, just as we, with all of our diversity, are woven together into the fabric of our community. I don't know about you, but I can't wait to see that ribbon altar cloth on Easter Sunday!
